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JAKARTA is a 12:00 minute percussion ensemble composition which uses the following percussion instruments: xylophone, 2 octave set of almglocken, 2 marimbas, bass marimba (an electric piano may be substituted), 1 octave set of tuned gongs, agogo bells, 4 tom toms, bells, timbales, 4 roto toms, medium and large tam tam, vibes, and shekere. A violin-

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ist and oboist are used in the la_{3t} third of the work.

JAKARTA is a profound work for percussion ensemble. As the name implies, it is a work which has its musical palette in the Mid-East, Mr. Snow has so orchestrated the work that the sounds which are heard remind one of a Gamelan orchestra. Intense care must be taken for enser ble accuracy as many of the ten pla ers are playing unison rhythms 1 rapid eighth and sixteenth note... Gongs are used as sustaining sounds over the rhythm or as interruptions to them. The violin and oboe add a coloristic timbre to the end of the work which gives it a unique flavor. Having performed JAKARTA, I can honestly say it is an excellent college level percussion ensemble. It is a work that is satisfying to perform and enjoyable for the listener. Congratulations to Davi Snow for writing a unique and refresh ing composition. (J.B.)

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
