

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

For the third year in a row, the dance ensemble welcomes back a past graduate. Ruby Shang '71, a former member of the Paul Taylor Dance Company and now the artistic director of her own dance company in New York City, spent two weeks in the fall sharing her art with all the dancers, through master classes, and with members of THE DANCE EXTENSION, theatre arts resident repertory dance company, by setting "Elephantes Exotiques" on them.

These are difficult times for modern dancers. We can no longer be called pioneers, though we still find pockets of ignorance about our art. I recently overheard students at our esteemed institution refer to modern dance as pretending to be flowers blooming. At moments like these I wonder just how much has changed since Isadora first discarded her point shoes and donned the tunic; since Martha found a basic truth in the earth and a power in the center of the body; since Doris transformed the everyday acts of standing erect in defiance of gravity and falling in complete submission to it, into an aesthetic and spiritual statement.

But at other moments I realize how far we have come. In some cases we are even part of the "art establishment" and therein lies our current challenge to continue to invent and create and dare to explore the unknown.

We of Brown theatre are particularly proud that even though we don't offer a dance concentration we have graduates, like Ruby throughout the dance world who have remained in the field and are making significant contributions to the continuing tradition that is modern dance.
