Here is a selective listing by critics of The Times of new or noteworthy opera, classical music and dance events this weekend in the New York metropolitan region.

MANHATTAN CHAMBER ORCHESTRA. Richard Auldon Clark and this orchestra can usually be counted on to provide an adventuresome program, and here they offer two in one day. First, in the centenary year of Kurt Weill, they perform music of that composer: "Mahagonny" and the "Berlin Requiem." Sunday at 2 p.m., Trinity Church, Broadway at Wall Street, (212) 602-0747; admission: \$2 suggested donation. Then they take up more contemporary fare: the premiere of Howard Cass's "Breakfast of Champions," based on a novel by Kurt Vonnegut; Eric Ewazen's Concerto for Trumpet and Strings; and David Snow's "On Clearwater Mountain." Chris Gekker, an excellent trumpeter, is the soloist in the Ewazen and Snow works. Sunday at 8:30 p.m., Weill Recital Hall, (212) 247-7800; tickets: \$15 and \$30; \$10 for students and the elderly (Oestreich).

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

The MANHATTAN CHAMBER ORCHESTRA was founded in 1987 by its artistic director and conductor, Richard Auldon Clark. Hailed by the media as an "extraordinary ensemble of virtuosos," and credited with providing the "definitive versions of forgotten American masterpieces," the Manhattan Chamber Orchestra has been dedicated to innovative, exciting and multicultural programming. The MCO has premiered and recorded the music of such diverse composers as William Grant Still, Alec Wilder, Victor Herbert, Henry Cowell, Alan Hovhaness, Otto Luening, Randall Thompson, David Amram, and Dave Soldier. The MCO performs music of all genres with a special emphasis on contemporary American music. In addition to touring and a heavy recording schedule, the MCO is regularly heard in the New York area. The orchestra has been featured at Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Symphony Space, Weill Recital Hall, Merkin Hall, and the United Nations. In 1995, the orchestra received the NAIRD "Indie" award for Best Classical Album for its CD Mountains and Rivers Without End. The MCO was awarded the 1995 Lincoln Center Arts Project Award and performed at Alice Tully Hall. The Manhattan Chamber Orchestra can be heard on the Newport Classic, KOCH International, AVANT, VOX, and Helicon labels.

RICHARD AULDON CLARK is one of the youngest conductors ever to appear on the stage of Carnegie Hall. A fervent proponent of American music, Mr. Clark has conducted more than one hundred world premiere performances and has 30 CD recordings in his rapidly expanding discography. He has committed the MCO to premiering and recording the music of young composers as well as that of more established artists whose works have been overlooked or forgotten. In addition to his conducting, Mr. Clark is an active recitalist and chamber musician. Originally from Apalachin, NY, Mr. Clark studied violin and viola in New York City with Raphael Bronstein, Ariana Bronne, and Lillian Fuchs. Mr. Clark is on the faculty of Rutgers University - Mason Gross School of the Arts and the Manhattan School of Music, where he received both his Bachelors and Masters degrees.

CHRIS GEKKER, trumpet, is a frequent soloist and guest artist with the Manhattan Chamber Orchestra. He has appeared as soloist in all of New York's major concert halls such as Carnegie Hall and Lincoln Center, as well as throughout the United States, Europe, and Asia. He performed and toured extensively for eighteen years as a member of the American Brass Quintet, and was principal trumpet of the Orchestra of St. Luke's. Mr. Gekker has appeared as soloist on many recordings, including the MCO's "Indie" Award-winning recording of music by Hovhaness, "*Mountains and Rivers Without End*". Formerly on the faculties of the Juilliard School and the Manhattan School of Music, Mr. Gekker is now Professor of Trumpet at the University of Maryland. Sunday, June 11, 2000 at 8:30 P.M.
